

Columbia International College & Shalom Village: Sharing, Caring and Contributing

Many of you may not have heard of Columbia International College (CIC), but at Shalom Village, the students of CIC have been a tremendous source of inspiration, volunteers and donations for many, many years.

Forty years ago, CIC started out with a handful of international students and a dream to help students from other countries come to Canada to enhance their education and to both learn from us and share their knowledge and experience with Canadians. Columbia International College is the largest boarding school in Canada. It's 18,000 students come to Canada from over 100 countries, and attend classes ranging from Grades 7 – 12. Students come from countries like China, Brazil, South Africa, Nigeria, Russia and more!



Columbia International College is unique in its approach to international education, because it works very hard to give students a fulsome experience of life in Canada. Part of that experience includes working with local partners to provide students with meaningful volunteer experiences, as well as other ways to give back to their Canadian hosts.



Shalom Village has benefitted from this in a variety of ways. Each year, the students of CIC join the *Hustle4Health* volunteer team to help us make sure the event runs smoothly, and that participants are cheered on as they cross the finish line. In previous years, students from CIC have visited Shalom Village to share stories of their lives and cultural influences from home. In many cases, our residents are learning about cultures they may never have experienced first-hand before.

In addition to their activities at Shalom Village, CIC students are achieving great things and being recognized in unique ways. Currently, the United Nations Association of Canada is working with CIC students to provide them with real-world experiences that UN delegates might experience. This includes visiting the UN headquarters in New York, identifying major current issues, and working collaboratively with other students to help find and present solutions to these issues.

Additionally, the staff and students at CIC are thrilled to have students who are receiving the Duke of Edinburgh Award. This award requires an enormous commitment. The Gold Project requires a 2 year commitment... something most adults would struggle to fulfil. There is some hope that the Duke himself may even present this year's award!

Lastly, in recent years, Shalom Village has been the recipient of significant donations from the students at CIC. Each week, students are offered the opportunity to dress casually. To take advantage of the casual dress code, students make donations. Each year, the student choose

If you were were listening to music that summer, you’d likely hear *Walk Right In* by Cannon’s Jug Stompers, *Ain’t Misbehavin’* by Fats Waller, or *Singin’ In The Rain* by Cliff Edwards. It’s interesting to note that many of us today have enjoyed popular versions of these songs many decades later.

Even in 1929, Canadians were very concerned about how we were perceived internationally.
